

INTEREST GROUPS K-6



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Ollie Online 2022

On Wednesday 19th of October K-2 and the Inclusive Classes had a cybersafety incursion called Ollie Online. October is AAC Awareness Month

International AAC Awareness Month is celebrated around the world each October. The goal is to raise awareness of augmentative and alternative

communication (AAC) and to inform the public about the many different ways in which people communicate using communication devices.

As human beings, we were designed to communicate. As communicators, we should be able to request, question, comment, express feelings and emotions, etc.

While some may not use their words to communicate, everyone should at least have the tools to be able to communicate.

AAC stands for Augmentative and Alternative Communication and it means all of the ways someone communicates besides talking. *Augmentative* means to add to someone's speech and *Alternative* means to use something other than speech.

Some people use AAC devices throughout their life, but others may use AAC for only a short period of time.

When can AAC devices be utilised? Signs a child could benefit from AAC devices:

- Your child is nonverbal.
- Your child's speech is hard to understand (i.e., child has childhood apraxia of speech, phonology disorder, etc.).
- Phonological Disorder occurs when phonological processes (patterns of sounds children use to simplify speech as they learn to talk) persist beyond the age when most typically developing children have stopped using them or when processes used are much different than what would be expected.
- Example "wabbit" for "rabbit", "tat" for "cat."
- Childhood apraxia of speech (CAS) is an uncommon speech disorder in which a child has difficulty making accurate movements when speaking. In CAS, the brain struggles to develop plans for speech movement.

- Your child has a limited vocabulary of less than approximately 50 words (This is not always the rule, and you can talk with your therapist if it is something your child could benefit from).
- Your child has a high level of scripted phrases e.g., Gestalt Language Processing or GLP.
- Scripting may be the child's way of learning language and is sometimes called "echoing." You can say something and they may just repeat it immediately after, or later in the day. The child typically has the knowledge of the words, but has difficulty putting it together to have a conversation.

Augmentative communication:

Augmentative means to add to someone's speech.

We all use some sort of augmentative communication every day and we may not even realise it. And a lot of the time, people will understand what we are trying to communicate.

Teachers and therapists may use some of these communication tactics when working with children:

- Writing
- Gestures/signing
- Pointing to pictures
- Choice Boards
- First-Then Visuals
- First-Then visuals are how our teachers structure activities of what they want to do. "First we do this, then we can do that." It is similar to a checklist and typically shows two pictures.

Alternative communication:

Alternative means to use something other than speech.

There are many different examples of Alternative communication, but a few of those include:

- What is
 - Core Word Vocabulary boards
 - Picture Exchange Communication System (PECS)
 - iPad Communication apps: LAMP, TouchChat, ProLoQuo2Go, Snap+Core
 - Dedicated Communication devices

Clarifying misunderstandings about AAC devices:

Some believe that using AAC hinders verbal speech, but that is not the case. In some instances, it can actually support verbal speech as it gives additional feedback via verbal cues and a direct verbal model of the vocabulary word when learning the vocabulary term.

Children also do not need to be a certain age or have intact cognition to benefit from AAC. It will not limit the child's verbal development. AAC has progressed and now children have access to different types of AAC so children with more significant cognitive impairments can successfully use AAC systems.

AAC devices are also not a "last resort" in speech-language intervention. AAC should be considered for anyone having difficulty accessing language, no matter their age or amount of intervention received.

AAC devices allow individuals the opportunity to practice using language in real life situations and are essential for development when verbal communication is challenging.

When should AAC be implemented and how to model

The best way parents, families, school teams, etc. can help implement the AAC system is to model, model, model!

Always have AAC devices available to your child throughout the day. Use a variety of activities and differing environments and model language on the system for your child as they are learning it.

CHOOSING A HELMET WHEN RIDING A BICYCLE OR SCOOTER

Always wear a helmet when riding a bicycle or a scooter. Helmets greatly reduce the risk of head injuries. In NSW, riders including children are required by law to wear an approved helmet.

When choosing the right helmet for your child, consider the following:

- Always choose an approved helmet that carries the Australian and New Zealand Standard logo. This is often displayed as a sticker on the inside of a helmet.
- Make sure the helmet is the right size. It should be comfortable and not too tight or too loose.
- Check to see if you can place two fingers above your child's eyebrows to the bottom of the helmet. The position of where the helmet sits on your child's head is important.
- The under-chin strap should be correctly adjusted, not twisted, and always buckled securely. There should be a one finger gap between the strap and the chin.
- Pick a helmet with a bright colour so it can be easily seen. Have your child help select their helmet colour. If you let your child have a say, chances are they will be more likely to wear it.
- Never wear a damaged helmet. If a helmet has been involved in an incident or dropped from a height, it should be replaced even with no visible damage. Check to see the condition of the shell and straps/buckle.

Help to promote safe riding behaviour by supervising your child. It's a great idea to talk with your child about the road environment including the traffic conditions, road signs and how and where they can ride safely.

By law, children under the age of 16 can ride on a footpath unless there is 'No Bicycles' signage installed. An adult rider who is supervising a bicycle rider under 16 may also ride with the young rider on the footpath.



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

School zones: understanding the rules

Children are small. harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable.

They need you to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

PLEASE CHOOSE SAFETY OVER CONVENIENCE

To help understand school zone traffic rules, refer below to our quick reference guide.

DOUBLE PARKING

You must not stop on the road alongside a car that is parked at anvtime.

Fine: exceeds \$362 Demerit points: 2



NO PARKING

You have two minutes to drop-off or pick-up and must stay within three metres of your vehicle.

If no spaces are available you cannot queue on the road way or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up. Fine: exceeds \$201

Demerit points: 2



FOOTPATH, DRIVEWAY OR NATURE STRIP

You must not stop across a driveway, footpath and nature strip for any reason.

Fine: exceeds \$362 Demerit points: 2



NO STOPPING

You cannot stop in a no stopping zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space). Fine: exceeds \$362 Demerit points: 2



PEDESTRIAN CROSSING

You must not stop on or within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing (unless a sign allows you to park there).

Fine: exceeds \$481 Demerit points: 2



BUS ZONE

You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus. Fine: exceeds \$362 Demerit points: 2



DID YOU KNOW?

In NSW, it is illegal to do a U-turn across an unbroken centre line, even in a school zone. Penalty: \$349 & 3 demerit points

U-turns in School Zones

Did you know that it is illegal to do a U-turn across an unbroken line in the centre of a road? Unbroken lines in the centre of a road guide drivers and are an important road safety feature, especially in school zones.

You might see unbroken lines in the centre of the road near pedestrian crossings and refuges, approaches to intersections and places where sight lines are restricted.

By completing an illegal U-turn, you are putting the school community at risk of injury or worse. Penalties and fines apply.

NO PARKING

Signs like these are displayed within your school zone. Make sure you read the signs carefully before you move away from your vehicle as some 'No Parking' signs may have time restrictions associated with them. Council Rangers and NSW Police actively patrol school zones, especially during drop-off and pick-up time periods. Make the right choice and keep our students safe.

DID YOU KNOW?

You can stop in a NO PARKING zone for a maximum of 2 mins. You must remain inside or within 3m of your vehicle. Penalties apply.

If there are no spaces available, you'll need to drive away and park elsewhere or return when there is space available.





Message from the Office

Payment

When making a payment online you can pay up to 3 DAYS before the due date of the payment. This is due to online transactions taking 48 hours to process.

Change of Contact/Address details


Please inform the office immediately if you have changed your contact or address details, so we can contact you in case of an emergency.
