Remembrance Day 2022



This year we came together K-6 to honour the country's fallen servicemen and women to commemorate Remembrance Day on Friday 11th November at 10:40am under the Cola. Our beautiful ceremony was conducted by our CPS leaders Tom, Kiera, Audrey and Chris.

This year at Concord Public School we began with the traditional order of service, including the commemorative address, laying of wreaths, and the sounding of the Last Post, two minute's silence.



Tom played the bugle call called the *Last Post* which signifies the end of a soldier's day. It was sounded at our Remembrance Day service to indicate that the soldier has gone to his final rest.

WHAT IS ANZAC DAY?

Remembrance Day (also called Armistice Day or Poppy Day) is a Memorial Day celebrated in Commonwealth countries, such as Great Britain, Australia and Canada. It's celebrated every year on November 11th. Remembrance Sunday is also celebrated, and this is held on the second Sunday in November each year.



WHY DO WE CELEBRATE REMEMBRANCE DAY ON THE 11th OF NOVEMBER?

Remembrance Day, on November 11th, marks the anniversary of when World War One ended. It ended on November 11th 1918 at 11 am, which is why many people hold a two-minute silence at 11 am on this day. The War was officially ended with the signing of the Armistice, which is why the day is also called Armistice Day.



Remembrance Day gives people the chance to remember those who fought and lost their lives during the war and honour their memory. It makes sure that we never forget the past, and that those who died didn't die in vain.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO CELEBRATE REMEMBRANCE DAY?

After so many years, your young students may be wondering why it is important for us to celebrate and mark Remembrance Day. In summary, it is all about memory. During WW1 there were around 20 million deaths and 21 million wounded in both the armed forces and civilian communities, including 60,000 Australians. Therefore, Remembrance Day is a day to honour and remember their lives and their sacrifices.

WEARING POPPIES

Poppies have become an important symbol for the war because the flower grew in Flanders, Belgium where important battles were fought. Leading up to Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday, paper poppies are sold to raise money to support serving, ex-service personnel and their families. Poppy wreaths and decorations are also laid on war memorials

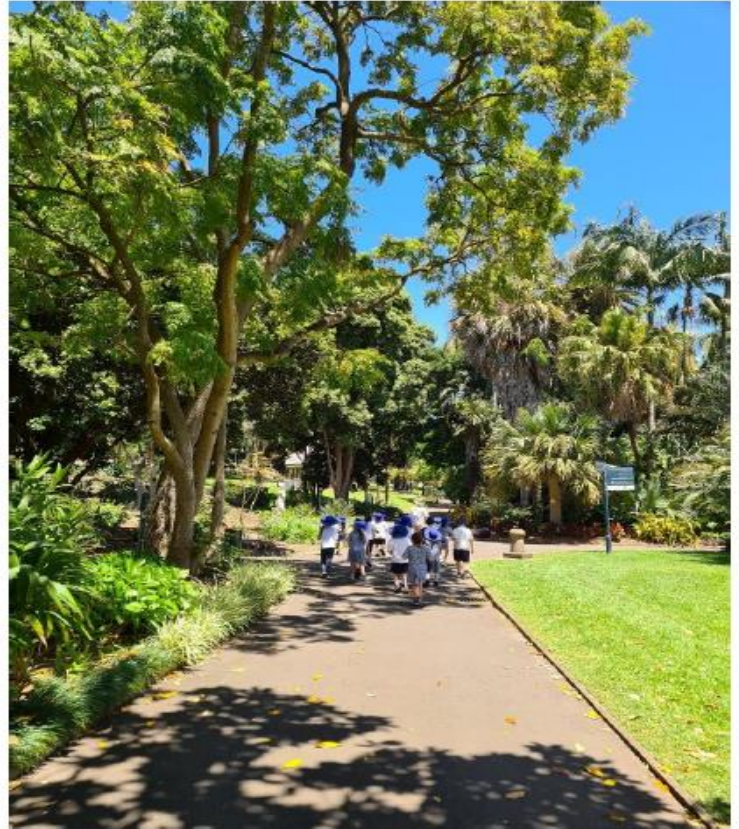

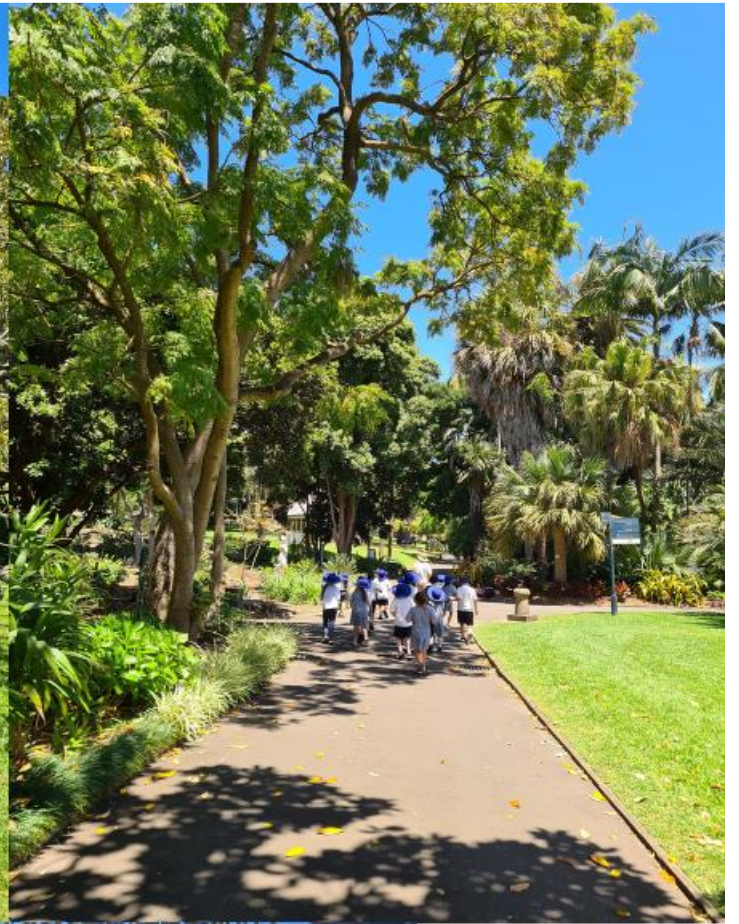

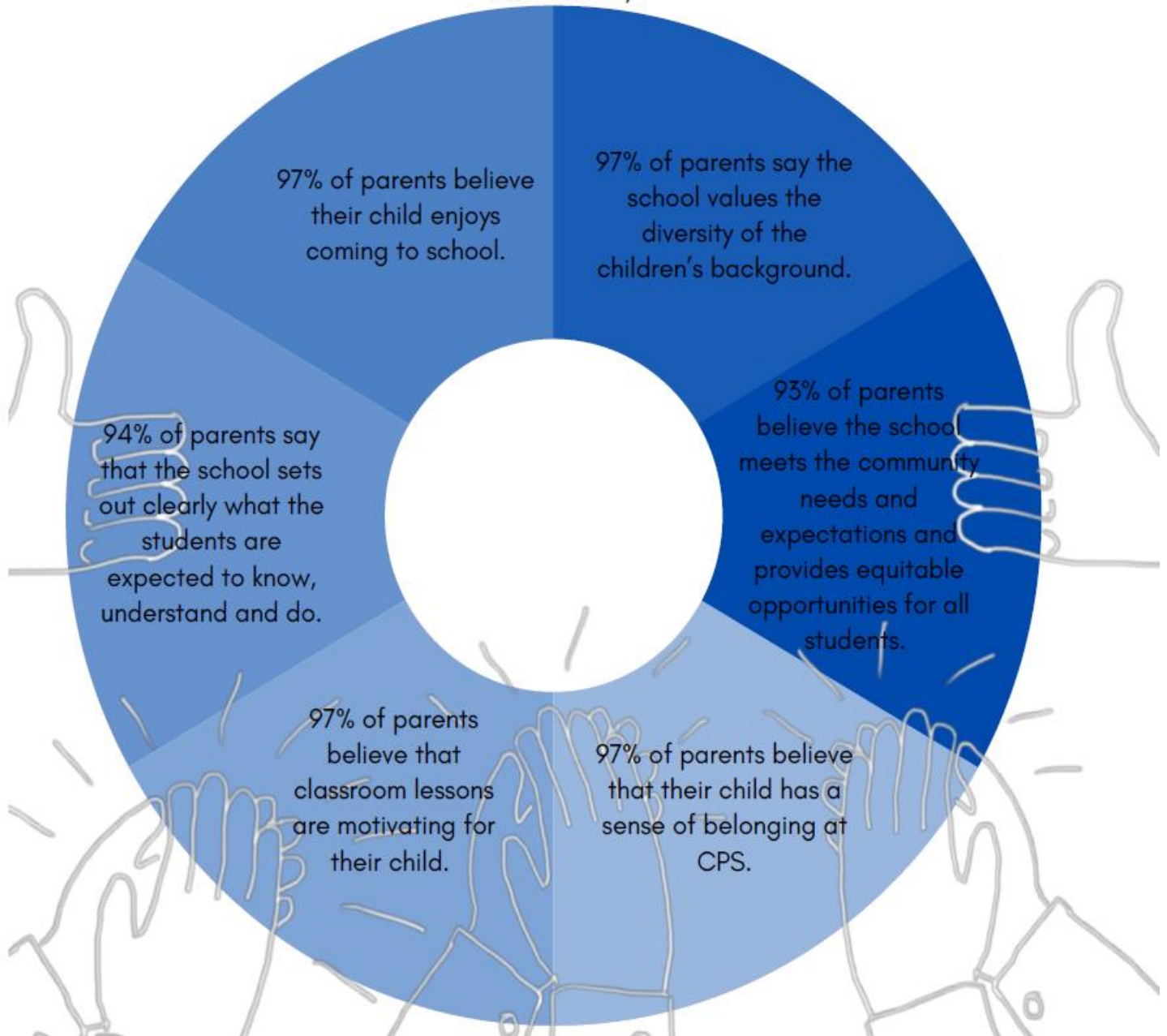






CELEBRATING 2022!

P&C Canteen



With the state wide initiative and legislation banning the use of single use plastics and coming into effect this week, we inform you that the school's canteen will now only be able to purchase environmentally friendly knives, forks and spoons from our suppliers.

As of Monday, 7th November we will only be able to furnish purchased goods requiring cutlery with environmentally friendly replacements.

These will be a timber variety.

We advise that if this is not suitable for your child that an alternative replacement be brought to school from home on the days required for purchased items.

COVID-smart measures for schools

Information for parents, carers and students



We know that being together in the classroom is the best thing for our students' learning, growth and welfare. This term we will continue to implement several measures to allow us to prioritise both the wellbeing of our students and a consistent and productive learning environment.



Stay home if unwell

- If your child is unwell, you must keep them at home. If they are displaying COVID-19 symptoms, they should take a COVID-19 test (PCR or RAT) and follow the advice from the NSW Government on [managing COVID-19 safely at home](#).
- Your child should only return to school when they are symptom free.



Vaccinations

- Vaccinations for COVID-19 and other viral illnesses are one of the best ways of protecting yourself, your family and the community. Vaccination is a safe and effective way to give your immune system a helping hand against many illnesses.
- All eligible students and staff are strongly encouraged to keep up to date with their vaccinations to protect their health.
- All staff working in schools for specific purposes (SSPs) are required to be double vaccinated against COVID-19 or hold a valid medical contraindication.



Rapid antigen testing

- Rapid antigen tests (RATs) should be used if your child is displaying COVID-19 symptoms.
- Students who test positive to COVID-19 are encouraged to notify their school and register their positive test results with [Service NSW](#) to have access to timely advice and support from NSW Health.
- Schools will maintain a reserve stock of rapid antigen tests onsite for surveillance testing purposes in the event of an outbreak.



Hygiene and cleaning

- Students are encouraged to regularly wash their hands with soap and warm water, and to use personal protective equipment as required.
- Boosted day cleaning of schools will continue on high-touch areas and other hard surfaces, door handles, lockers, light switches and handrails in stairways.



Ventilation

- Fresh air is the most effective form of ventilation to minimise the risk of transmission.
- During the warmer months, cooling will be used together with ventilation methods to balance thermal comfort.
- All learning spaces in government schools have been checked to ensure appropriate levels of ventilation and air purifiers have been provided where needed.
- Using outdoor spaces will continue to be encouraged where possible.



Masks

- Mask-wearing is strongly encouraged where possible for all students, staff and visitors, particularly indoors and/or when physical distancing is not possible, and if they have been exposed to COVID-19.
- Mask-wearing is required at all times for staff, volunteers and other workers who support our students who are at greater risk of serious illness should they contract COVID-19, whether they be in schools for specific purposes (SSPs), support units or mainstream classrooms.



Visitors

- Visitors can attend school sites regardless of their vaccination status.
- Visitors who are engaging directly with students in certain higher-risk settings for school operations and curriculum delivery and allied health partners for the wellbeing of students, may be required to wear masks.



Activities

- Health and safety risk assessments will be integrated when planning activities, including excursions and overnight camps.
- Parents and carers will be made aware of the risk of exposure and will need to give permission for certain activities.



Responding to local situations

- Schools will work with the department's Health, Safety and Staff Wellbeing case management team to respond appropriately to local situations, including outbreaks of viral illness.
- In some cases, schools may temporarily introduce additional measures as a 'circuit breaker', including requiring mask-wearing, postponing or limiting non-essential activities and directing cohorts to learn remotely.



Learning remotely

- Schools continue to have access to digital, guided and printed learning resources to support students who need to learn remotely.

CHOOSING A HELMET WHEN RIDING A BICYCLE OR SCOOTER

Always wear a helmet when riding a bicycle or a scooter. Helmets greatly reduce the risk of head injuries. In NSW, riders including children are required by law to wear an approved helmet.

When choosing the right helmet for your child, consider the following:

- Always choose an approved helmet that carries the Australian and New Zealand Standard logo. This is often displayed as a sticker on the inside of a helmet.
- Make sure the helmet is the right size. It should be comfortable and not too tight or too loose.
- Check to see if you can place two fingers above your child's eyebrows to the bottom of the helmet. The position of where the helmet sits on your child's head is important.
- The under-chin strap should be correctly adjusted, not twisted, and always buckled securely. There should be a one finger gap between the strap and the chin.
- Pick a helmet with a bright colour so it can be easily seen. Have your child help select their helmet colour. If you let your child have a say, chances are they will be more likely to wear it.
- Never wear a damaged helmet. If a helmet has been involved in an incident or dropped from a height, it should be replaced even with no visible damage. Check to see the condition of the shell and straps/buckle.

Help to promote safe riding behaviour by supervising your child. It's a great idea to talk with your child about the road environment including the traffic conditions, road signs and how and where they can ride safely.

By law, children under the age of 16 can ride on a footpath unless there is 'No Bicycles' signage installed. An adult rider who is supervising a bicycle rider under 16 may also ride with the young rider on the footpath.

- Is the size/position correct for my child's head?
- Can the strap be adjusted?
- Is it comfortable to wear?

School zones: understanding the rules

Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable.

They need you to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.

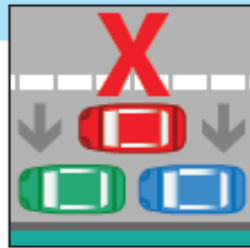
PLEASE CHOOSE SAFETY OVER CONVENIENCE

To help understand school zone traffic rules, refer below to our quick reference guide.

DOUBLE PARKING

You must not stop on the road alongside a car that is parked at anytime.

Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



NO PARKING

You have two minutes to drop-off or pick-up and must stay within three metres of your vehicle.

If no spaces are available you cannot queue on the road way or in any other zones while waiting for a space. You will need to drive away and park elsewhere, only returning when there is space to pull up.

Fine: exceeds \$201
Demerit points: 2



FOOTPATH, DRIVEWAY OR NATURE STRIP

You must not stop across a driveway, footpath and nature strip for any reason.

Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



NO STOPPING

You cannot stop in a no stopping zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space).

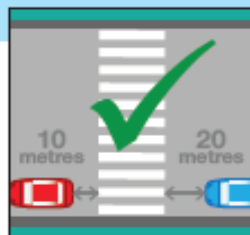
Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



PEDESTRIAN CROSSING

You must not stop on or within 20 metres before a pedestrian crossing or 10 metres after a crossing (unless a sign allows you to park there).

Fine: exceeds \$481
Demerit points: 2



BUS ZONE

You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus.

Fine: exceeds \$362
Demerit points: 2



SPEEDING

40km/h school zones are in force on all days which are not a weekend, a public holiday or a publicly notified school holiday for government schools. School zone days include school development days, also known as student-free days.

Fine: maximum penalty \$3,996
Demerit points: +7

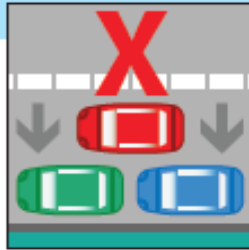

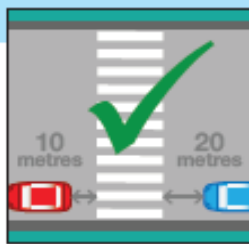

扣分：2分



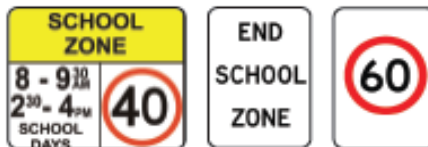

DID YOU KNOW?

In NSW, it is illegal to do a U-turn across an unbroken centre line, even in a school zone.

Penalty: \$349 & 3 demerit points



U-turns in School Zones

Did you know that it is illegal to do a U-turn across an unbroken line in the centre of a road? Unbroken lines in the centre of a road guide drivers and are an important road safety feature, especially in school zones.

You might see unbroken lines in the centre of the road near pedestrian crossings and refuges, approaches to intersections and places where sight lines are restricted.

By completing an illegal U-turn, you are putting the school community at risk of injury or worse. Penalties and fines apply.

NO PARKING

Signs like these are displayed within your school zone. Make sure you read the signs carefully before you move away from your vehicle as some 'No Parking' signs may have time restrictions associated with them. Council Rangers and NSW Police actively patrol school zones, especially during drop-off and pick-up time periods. Make the right choice and keep our students safe.

DID YOU KNOW?

You can stop in a **NO PARKING** zone for a maximum of 2 mins. You must remain inside or within 3m of your vehicle. Penalties apply.

If there are no spaces available, you'll need to drive away and park elsewhere or return when there is space available.



Message from the Office

Payment

When making a payment online you can pay up to 3 DAYS before the due date of the payment. This is due to online transactions taking 48 hours to process.
